First up is [Nopales](#). A simple shape, dramatic neckline, some pretty lace, and welted cuffs and collar make a lovely cardigan. See?



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I really want you to take a closer look at some of those details, because they are really just perfect.



This week I have a close lady friend in town from Montreal. We have been friends for 12 years, and it's such a joy to be in the same city for a few days! She has a very particular sense of style that is as girly as mine, but also somehow more practical, folksy, and whimsical. Leah can spin, dye fiber, felt, and knit. She also does marquetry and some metalsmithing. She plays several odd string

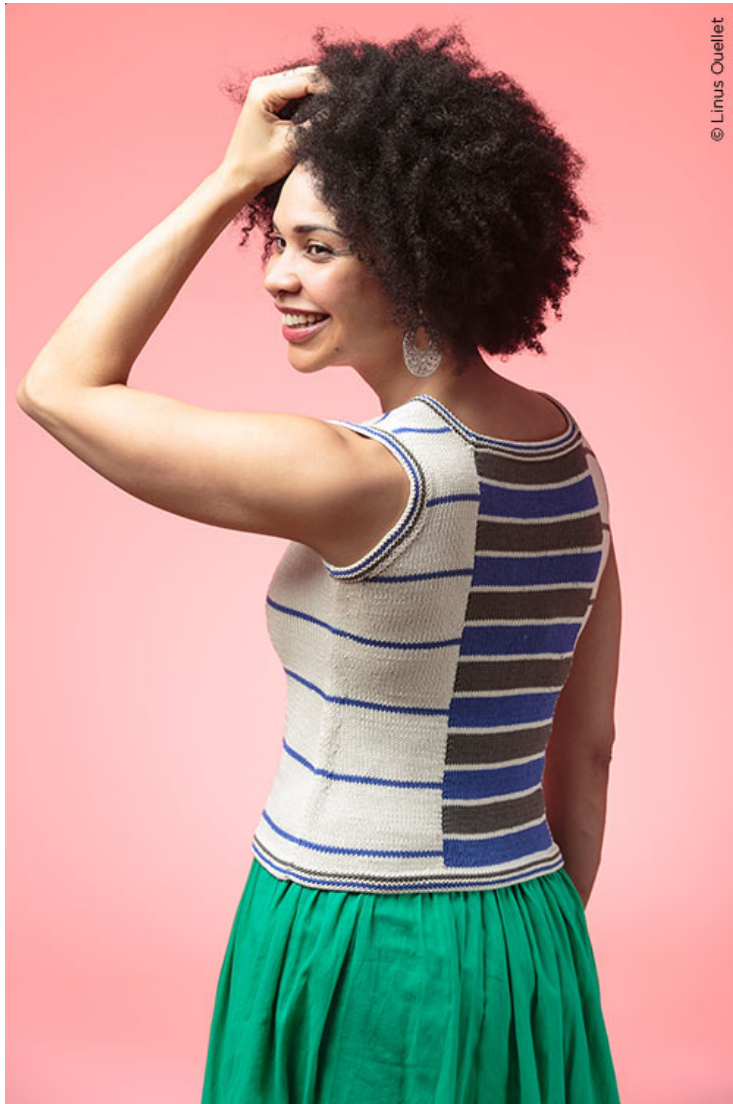

If you're going to wear something else punchy with it, I'd go with a texture (like the lace skirt on the left, below) over a print or pattern. I really cannot wait to see the color combinations knitters dream up for this top. I think almost anything could work, but I am most excited about combos that use a neutral and two brights.
